<p>"Sadly, the fifth child was a stillbirth, b/d/Jan. 26, 1750 at a time when plans were undoubtedly already underway for the family to leave Beerfelden for America. Probably in May, 1750, only four months after the still birth, the family was headed down the Neckar and Rhine Rivers. They were halted at, then successfully passed, some 26 custom houses enroute, until at last they reached Rotterdam in Holland. There in early June they boarded the ship <i>Brothers</i> and sailed for Cowes on the Isle of Wright where they cleared English customs. The ocean voyage across the Atlantic lasted two months. When they were half way across, on July 31st and unbeknownst to them, the widowed mother Anna <i>Kumpf</i> Rauenzahner back in Beerfelden died at the age of sixty. She had stayed behind with two daughters and her only other surviving son, her youngest."</p> <p>"Usually as a precursor to land ownership, German-born settlers sought naturalization as English subjects. This in turn required their having lived in the colony for a least seven years and their taking communion in a Protestant church.....On Sept. 27, 1765 Ludwick Rauenzahner of Rockland Township and son Adam Rauenzahner of Ruscombmanor Township took their communion and naturalized in Philadelphia in September or October."</p>
